## Toys keep your rabbit's body healthy and its mind occupied.

<u>Cardboard Boxes & Tubes</u> - Turn a cardboard box upside down and cut a rabbit sized door, for extra interest fill the box with shredded paper or add a tunnel to get in/out. Small tubes can be stuffed with hay, larger ones can be used as tunnels.

**Balls** - Solid plastic balls (e.g. cat balls) make good toys for your rabbit to push around. They can also be hung up for your rabbit to play with.

Flower Pots - Large ceramic pots make great hidey hole's, use a brick each side to stop it rolling away. Smaller plastic pots can be rolled around, stuffed with hay or hung up with hay or leafy greens in.

**<u>Grass Tray</u>** - Fill a seed tray with organic compost and sprinkle on grass seeds. Water once a day and you should soon have a tray full of grass. For extra interest you could add a few dandelion seeds as well.

Safety – Insure toys don't have sharp edges. Check regularly that the rabbit isn't chewing apart and ingesting plastic toys. Wood, soil etc. should not be treated with harmful chemicals.
